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The Beauty of Our Dreams

Stewardship Campaign – it's that time of year again.

Though, in some ways, it's not quite the same time as in previous years. We're a little later this year, pushed back a bit to enjoy some breathing space after a later-than-usual church auction. But stewardship this year is also different because of a future for HPCUU we are all working to re-imagine. It is a future bound up in hope tempered by apprehension, in excitement tinged with distress, and in vision veiled under uncertainty. We don't yet know how the sale of our facility will resolve, either in time or in dollars. Details remain to be ironed out regarding the prospect of shared space and common commitment with Vista Grande Community Church. Yet by survey and by congregational vote, it is clear that most among us are ready to follow the course our congregation and our board have charted.

We might be tempted to heave a sigh of relief at the coming elimination of mortgage payments and liability concerns associated with our current facility. We might be tempted to relax our financial commitment to our faith community. And we have, after all, been a generous lot in recent years, ranking high among UU congregations in our average annual pledge. It is partly in view of this past generosity that during this campaign we will be asking only for pledges that sustain giving a current levels and not for any percentage or dollar-amount increase in pledges – though hey, we'll be more than grateful for any we may see in the

assembled pledges we tally later this spring. But we do need to remember that mere solvency in the current fiscal year relied on generous one-time donations to avoid what would otherwise have been a substantial shortfall. We need to keep in mind as well the facility expenses we may incur by end of decade in order to establish the new interfaith center we envision. Any contributions beyond budget for the 2017/2018 fiscal year would be a great start on anticipated capital expenditures. And, of course, personnel and program costs remain, wherever we may later celebrate our church community.

We will build our re-imagined HPCUU future around our dreams of expanding interfaith cooperation in pursuit of shared values. It is an expansion much needed in our community, in our country, and in our world. A quotation attributed to Eleanor Roosevelt suggests, “The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams.” (And for those fact-checking Google hounds out there: Yes, I did notice the doubts expressed over that attribution, but I suspect that Famous People, looking back from The Great Beyond, may feel the most pride over credit they enjoy for remarks they never really made.) The theme for our 2017 stewardship campaign will be **Believing in the Beauty of Our Dreams**. When stewardship packets arrive in the mail in mid-March, let us all muster as much generosity as we reasonably can to honor and support the beauty of our HPCUU dreams.

Minister's Musings

The biggest risk is not taking any risk... In a world that is changing really quickly, the only strategy that is guaranteed to fail is not taking risks. ~Mark Zuckerberg

"Risk" is our theme this month and it couldn't be more timely for us. The congregational vote on January 29 put us on an exciting, yet a bit risky trek. We don't know when our building will sell. We are unsure how this new scenario is going to work out. Even as we work to manage the risk of this transition as best as possible, there is simply much we do not know. But there's no getting around the reality that life is full of risk. I'm picking up on a great deal of excitement in the air, along with some trepidation, simply because our decision to move has opened up new and exciting possibilities for taking meaningful action that has a lasting positive impact not only on ourselves but countless others in our community.

"How are we a people of Risk?" is the big question of the month and it seems that many of us have been experiencing new levels of risk-taking through new participation in rallies, protests, letter-writing campaigns, visiting (or trying to visit) with local and national legislators, etc. The ground swell of resistance is happening because the threat to our well being and the well being of others has become so great that we are willing to face the risk of becoming active in the work to resist and hopefully prevent the threats. There are times when we must take a stand and rally around the causes we believe in. I am with you in these efforts and attend as many events as I can. Yet, I am reminded that with any movement, there is the risk of taking it too far and losing perspective. Our greatest challenge as

UU's is to walk that razor's edge of working towards equality and human rights while continuing to affirm and promote the inherent worth and dignity of all people (not just the one's we agree with). In other words, standing on the side of love without giving in to our own inclinations toward hatred and bitterness.

As I ponder these things, I ask myself an even bigger question, what must we risk to make a lasting difference in stopping and reversing this out-of-control division in our country? Aside from all of the policies and executive orders and laws that we must fight, what concerns me the most is the schism that is growing. At some point, the most powerful resistance force any of us could create is the one that brings people together from all sides. Granted, there are plenty of people on all sides who are not willing to go there, not willing to take THAT risk. But I am convinced that there are plenty of other people from all sides who are good people with common sense who are willing to engage in meaningful dialogue and unified action. I am reminded of a quote by Winston Churchill, "Courage is what it takes to stand up and speak; courage is also what it takes to sit down and listen."

Perhaps our greatest calling is to take the riskiest path of all, to uphold the value of listening to those with whom we disagree, to find common ground, and begin working together. The greatest risk has the greatest reward. May we find the courage to love for the hope of healing and to find others, from all sides, willing to do the same.

We are thrilled to welcome Sonya Bergeron, a student at Naropa University, for two Saturday workshops on Yoga Nidra. Sonya is a Yoga Alliance 200 hour RYT (Registered Yoga Teacher). After practicing yoga nidra, she detected a renewed calmness in the mind and a sense of peace. This peace of mind drives her motivation to teach and share yoga nidra with others. Yoga nidra is a series of structured awareness techniques that induce full-body relaxation and a deep meditative state of consciousness. In the threshold between the waking and sleeping states, the superconscious mind is accessible. By practicing yoga nidra, you are opening up

to your true self. The aim of yoga nidra is to develop a deep and true understanding that you are all that you have been looking for.

Join Sonya Saturday, March 25th and April 1st from 10:00 am - 11:30 am in the Spirit Play (elementary) room. There is no cost to attend these workshops, however registration is requested (https://secure.jotform.us/HighPlainsDFF/Adult_Ed_Registration).

Classes are open to anyone 12 years of age and up. Sonya will provide yoga mats, but participants are encouraged to bring their own yoga mats and resting props if they have them.



The President's Post

Hello Everyone!

I can't believe it! Several little crocuses have popped up by my front door! I hope they don't get blindsided by a Spring snowstorm, but that's Colorado weather for you. Meanwhile, I am loving the warm days and cool nights and hope you are too. Haven't seen a robin yet. Have you?



Bringing you up to date on the sale of our property and rental possibilities - John Atkinson and I met with Taylor and Dale Stamp of Quantum Realty, shortly after the congregational vote. We told them that we appreciated their help during the strategic planning process, and that if they were willing to reduce their commission on the sale of our building, we would choose them to represent us. They were happy to do so, and as you can see, we are now on the multiple listing service and they have placed For Sale signs on our property. The listing price is \$1.5 million.

A while ago I served on the board of TESSA, the nonprofit in Colorado Springs that advocates for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. The President of the Board at that time was Alex Dumas of Olive Realty. As it happens, he is the realtor for the owner of the building at 5510 Union where the Buddhist Center is located. As you know, half of that building is vacant. The big question is how do we pay for that rental while we are waiting for our facility to sell. The Board also decided that we ought to have professional advice on rental terms and a potential lease. Therefore, we engaged

Quantum Realty, the same realtors who are selling our building, to assist us with renting space. I'll try to keep you posted as we proceed with all negotiations. So far we have had two inquiries about Dominion Way - both churches. They will be looking at our property in the next two weeks.

Be on the lookout for notice of an Active Shooter training session. We hope to hold one soon, in cooperation with Vista Grande.

The Stewardship Campaign is almost here, and I would like to make a personal plea to each and every one of you to give as generously as you are able. Even though we have taken substantial steps to stabilize our financial situation, we still need to meet our operating costs - like the cost of our staff - and make our loan payments. Once the building is sold, we will pay off our loans, but will still have costs of sharing space with Vista Grande, utilities, staff, and team expenses, among others. So please continue your generous level of giving. We are counting on it!

We appreciate everything you do for High Plains, as well as your financial contributions!

An American Conscience:

The Reinhold Niebuhr Story

Sunday, March 5th at 3:00 pm in the Library 21C

Although he may be best remembered today as the author of the famed "Serenity Prayer," Reinhold Niebuhr – an outspoken American-born pastor, writer, and political activist – remains one of the most influential public theologians of our time. Presidents from Barack Obama to Jimmy Carter have credited his impact on their thinking, as well as John McCain, countless historians, theologians, political thinkers, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who cited Niebuhr in his "Letter from a Birmingham Jail,"

Niebuhr's career spanned some of the most tumultuous decades in American history, from World War I through Vietnam, from the Great Depression through the Civil Rights Movement. An early pacifist and socialist, he was closely monitored by J. Edgar Hoover's FBI throughout his life, but would later serve as a consultant to the State Department during the Cold War.

Niebuhr rose from a small Midwest church pulpit to become the nation's moral voice – an American conscience – during some of the most defining moments in recent history. His books, *Moral Man and Immoral Society* (1932), *The Nature and Destiny of Man* (1941-43) and *The Irony of American History* (1952), continue to influence theological and political thinking. An American original, his unique insights into human nature and its relationship to political movements and social justice propelled him to speak openly, and often critically, to an America consumed by moral certainty. For Niebuhr the priority was always justice, his guiding

principle was hope in a redeemer God, and his weapon was an extraordinary gift for clarity of thought that made him a leading voice of conscience for his time.

Ms. Lynn's trademark post-presentation question-and-answer session is unique in that no trans subject is off-limits. The take away is a clear and deep understanding of issues facing transgender people today.
